## What I already know...

- Compromises between people can be made.
- People have different viewpoints and opinions.
- Our own and others' values and opinions are important.
- Debate is a way of expressing your opinions and opening your mind to alternative viewpoints.



## What I will learn...

- That prejudice is a preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience.
- That the word prejudice is often used when people dislike another group of people who are different from them.
- That discrimination is when a person is treated differently (not in a good way) because of some aspect of their identity.
- That discrimination is against the law.
- That there are many different ways to safely tackle discrimination (such as by speaking out, challenging behavior, celebrating diversity and learning from others).

## Key Vocabulary

<b>Prejudice</b>	A preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience.
<b>Preconceived</b>	To form an opinion on something before you have experienced it yourself.
<b>Discrimination</b>	When a person is treated differently because of who they are or an aspect of their identity. Discrimination is where somebody is not treated in a good way.
<b>Challenge</b>	To contest something that you disagree with.
<b>Diversity</b>	Differences between two or more things (e.g. between people).
<b>Celebrate</b>	To acknowledge a significant, happy or positive thing or moment in time.
<b>Challenge</b>	To contest something that you disagree with.
<b>Identity</b>	Who a person is. All of the things by which a person or thing is known or is considered as being.
