What I already know...

Children will build upon their further developing their understanding of invasion game tactics and skills built up throughout Key Stage 2, applying these to the new sport of handball.

Children will be familiar with a range of strokes for serving and returning a tennis ball.

What I will learn...

Handball

- To know a variety of different passes such as an overarm pass, bounce pass, jump pass and side pass
- To know when to use a variety of different passes
- To know how to create space, move towards goal and away from defenders.
- To know how to use defending skills to stop an opponent from scoring.

Tennis

- To know how to return a ball using forehand and backhand groundstrokes.
- To know how to volley and understand when to use it.
- To learn how to use the official scoring system.
- To know how to work cooperatively with a partner and employ doubles tactics.

Key Vocabulary

Overhead pass	A pass to a teammate that is made above shoulder level. The most common pass in handball.
Foot (foul)	A foot foul occurs when a player touches the ball with their foot or shin.
Handling	Dribbling, catching, passing or shooting the ball in handball.
Jump pass/shot	A shooting/passing technique performed when the player's feet are off the floor.
Advantage	A player who scores a point at 'deuce' has the advantage, meaning if they score the next point, they win the game.
Deuce	A score of 40-40. A player must win two consecutive points to win the game.
Love	A score of zero.
Set	In scoring. A player must win at least six games to win a set.
Game point	A point that will end the game.
