What I already know...

What I will learn...

Children will engage in competitive and co-operative physical activities, in a range of increasingly challenging situations and will be taught how to participate in team games

Children will develop their communication and problem solving skills by working individually, in pairs and in small groups, learning to take turns, work collaboratively and lead each other.

Children will be given the opportunity to discuss and plan their ideas to get the most successful outcome.

Children will:

- cooperate and communicate with a partner to solve challenges
- explore and develop teamwork s, and communication skills
- use communication skills to lead a partner—to follow and lead a partner on a 'path'
- plan with a partner and small group to solve problems.
- communicate with a group to solve challenges.
- understand the rules of a game
- develop social, emotional and thinking skills such as encouraging and supporting others, developing confidence, trust and honesty as well as decision making and tactical thinking skills.

This half term children will develop their communication and problem solving skills. They will work individually, in pairs and in small groups, learning to take turns, work collaboratively and lead each other. They are given the opportunity to discuss and plan their ideas to get the most successful outcome.
