What I already know...

We already understand how to make different shades and tints by adding either black or white to paint. In the spring term we developed our sketching and drawing techniques and understand how to use techniques such as feathering to add fine detail.

What I will learn...

- Van Gough was an influential artist due to his use of bright modern colours which I will link to my own work
- To know that adding white to a colour will create a lighter colour.
- To know that adding black to a colour will create a darker colour.
- A gallery is a public building where artwork is displayed
- The primary colours are yellow, red and blue, they cannot be mixed from other colours.
- To use drawing and painting to develop and share ideas, experiences and imagination
- To develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space

Primary Colours	Primary colours are basic colours that can be mixed together to produce other colours
Secondary Colours	Secondary colours like green, orange and purple are created by combining two primary colours
space	The area around or between objects. Space includes the background, foreground and middle ground.

Tints	To lighten a colour by adding white
Shade	To darken a colour by adding black
Drawing	To experiment with the visual elements: line, shape and colour.
