#### What I will learn...

- Key dates of the Roman invasions of Britain (failures by Julius Caesar in 55BC and success by Emperor Claudius in 43AD)
- The Celt uprising against the Romans led by Boudicca - that she was successful for a time but eventually was defeated by the Romans.
- That the Romans revolutionised travel by building roads and that some of these roads exist today including Fosse Way and roads through Syston.
- The locations of important towns in Roman Britain including Leicester (Ratae).
- The changes in Roman political organisation from the senate democracy to the emperors - how this was started by Julius Caesar.
- About some important early emperors: Augustus, Caligula, Claudius, Nero
- Roman life & living conditions including central heating and public baths.
- How Roman ideas such as democracy, as well as things such as central heating, roads and architecture are still visible and impact us today.
