## Key Vocabulary

Tempo	The speed at which a piece of music is played.





## Making a difference at The Merton and beyond

In this topic the children will embed the skills they have learnt throughout the year. They will experiment with clay and create a sea inspired tile. The activities that will be put on offer will be more independent tasks to enable children to apply what they have learnt into their own creations, enabling them to explore textures and media Our classroom is set up to encourage independence and they have been taught to be resourceful. The children will create their own pirate portrait of themselves. There will be opportunities for children to create observational drawings of sea creatures, 3D collaged telescopes, paper-plate parrots and use natural resources to make stick pirate ships. Children will learn a large range of songs to help them learn about tempo, pulse and rhythm. The children will move on to focus on how the syllables in words can be used to formulate simple rhythms and how these can be notated in simple graphical scores using printed images. The unit culminates in a class performance where groups perform their composed ostinato patterns to an audience.
