Making a difference at The Merton and beyond

Children will learn about famous artists linked to the surrealist movement - Dali, Magritte, Miro. They will explore the world of surrealism and learn about some of the ideas behind this art movement.

Children will use sketching and painting skills developed through Year 3 to imitate and then create their own surrealist art. Later, they will also work collaboratively to create a whole class piece of art in the style of one of the artists we study.

How to be an artist...

Drawing: To use sketching skills to carry out an observational drawing of an object. To use scale, line and shape when sketching. Painting: To use the colour wheel and experiment with complementary colours and create colour palette. To use warm (yellow, orange and red) and cold (blue, green and purple) colour palettes. Printing: To create a repeated print of a design
